Most of the world will experience declines in the size of the working-age population: China is projected to lose half a billion people in the coming decades, with most of the decline in the working ages; while Africa will be the one region with continued growth. The end of world population growth is now in sight, with the peak in the world's working-age population coming even sooner. 	6A	<p>Special Session #1: Tasks, Skills and Institutions: The Changing Nature of Work & Inequality</p> <p><i>CHAIR: Federica Saliola (The World Bank)</i></p> <p>The session will present the findings from the UNU-WIDER project on The changing nature of work and inequality. A new edited volume is available free and Open Access from the UNU-WIDER and Oxford University Press Series in Development Economics books. The volume is based on new analysis and empirical data of the occupational structure of labour markets in 12 countries in the Global South. In each country, researchers tested the validity of a wage polarization hypothesis using micro-level data on the routine-task intensity of occupations. A global analysis finds that work is distributed unevenly across higher and lower-income countries by routine task intensity, with a much greater share of high-earning, knowledge-intensive work accruing to high-income countries.
